Looking Forward to 2013

While Tallahassee watchers and followers wait for the November elections to fill in the remaining House and Senate puzzle pieces, things are beginning to happen that will have an impact upon the upcoming 2013 regular session of the Florida Legislature.

The first gathering of returning and newly elected lawmakers will take place on Nov. 20, 2012, in Tallahassee during the traditional biannual organizational session. Newly elected legislators will be sworn in, and Senate President-Designate Don Gaetz (R-Niceville)

and House Speaker-Designate Wil Weatherford (R-Wesley Chapel) will begin their terms presiding over their respective chambers.

Budget

Both incoming Senate President Gaetz and incoming House Speaker Weatherford have recently indicated their selections for their respective appropriations chairmanships. For the next two years, Senator Joe Negron (R-Stuart)

Jacksonville HUD field office directors to get the latest news from HUD along with answers to questions submitted by our members. This has been a valuable tool for members who have questions for HUD, but who prefer to ask those questions in a format that is more general than specific. Moreover, this forum provides an opportunity to pose cutting edge, push the envelope type questions that are better asked in this format as opposed to the housing authority contacting HUD directly. During our October call with HUD, we were informed that HUD will implement a "value added exercise" this year, designed to help housing authorities perform better. To accomplish its goals, HUD will provide budget review guidance, tools to maximize housing choice voucher and public housing occupancy, information on how to be lead-based paint compliant with your HCV program and other creative tools that are designed to enhance the overall operations of your housing authority.

On Nov. 6, 2012, exercise your right to vote by casting your ballot in the presidential election. And encourage your residents to do the same by communicating to them the importance of being part of the political process. This is a privilege and a right for which many Americans have sacrificed their lives. Regardless of your politics, you have a responsibility to vote in this life-changing election. Five HCD Advocacy Priorities Through the November Election

From now through the election, national NAHRO's Congressional Relations team will be concentrating on five things: 1) sequestration and a so-called "grand bargain"; 2) SHARP; 3) the 9 percent tax credit extension; 4) the HUD 2013 appropriation; and 5) a voucher reform push in the Senate.

Sequestration: Sequestering of funds through mandatory across-the-board budget cuts—if not avoided by a separate agreement—will go into effect on Jan. 1, 2013. According to HUD and OMB, the impact of sequestration on housing and community development (HCD) programs would be an 8.2 percent cut to all programs. A bipartisan group of senators, known as the "gang of eight," are under pressure to arrive at a "grand bargain," which will likely mirror Simpson-Bowles and call for a balanced approach to deficit reduction consisting of appropriate cuts and revenue increases. Small Agency Reform: As of Sept. 14, the NAHRO/PHADA SHARP proposal has been introduced in the Senate. Senator Mike Johanns (R-Neb.) and John Tester (D-Mont.) have sponsored S.5838, the Small Public Housing Agency Opportunity Act of 2012 (SPHAOA), on a bipartisan basis. A copy of the

bill as introduced can be found at www.NAHRO.org/sites/default/files/searchable/MAC12351.pdf. The bill will likely not be focused on until the next Congress. However, as you talk with your representatives during their campaigning, please discuss SHARP and their interest in cosponsoring in either the House or Senate.

Extension of the 9 Percent Tax Credit: At this time, a permanent extension is not likely. However, the tax extenders package that was approved in August by the Senate Finance Committee contains an amendment that would continue the 9 percent floor for low-income housing tax credits allocated through Dec. 31, 2013.

FY 2013 Funding: We will also be closely following negotiations that may lead to the approval of an omnibus spending package for FY 2013.

Voucher Reform Legislation: Negotiations on the House's Affordable Housing and Self Sufficiency Act (AHSSIA) came to a halt late this past summer. Early next year, we need to be ready to push both houses to act expeditiously on voucher reform. We urge you to talk to your members of Congress now to help move responsible reform legislation forward with all due speed.

Administration Releases Sequestration Details

The Sequestration Transparency Act, signed into law in August 2012, required the administration to issue a report detailing the various effects sequestration would have on federal government programs. On Sept. 14, the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) released its report (www.WashingtonPost.com/blogs/ ezra-klein/files/2012/09/Combined_STAReport_Watermark.pdf), providing line-item estimates of cuts that will be made to each program if the sequester goes into effect on Jan. 2, 2013, as mandated by current law. The report urges the Congress to take action to avoid the sequester, saying that "sequestration would undermine investments vital to economic growth, threaten the safety and security of the American people, and cause severe harm to programs that benefit the middle-class, seniors, and children."

The sequester was authorized by the Budget Control Act of 2011 (BCA), the legislation that raised the debt ceiling, set top-line spending caps for each year through FY 2021 and required the federal government to enact measures to reduce the federal deficit substantially. The BCA established the bipartisan Joint Select Committee on Deficit Reduction, also known as the "Super Committee," and charged it with developing a plan to reduce the deficit by at least \$1.2 trillion by 2021. To incentivize the committee to find common ground, the BCA mandated a wildly unpopular alternative should the committee fail: sequestration. If the committee did not reach agreement, a fate that ultimately did come to pass, sequestration would guarantee that automatic acrossthe-board cuts would go into effect. As designed in the BCA, these cuts would be spread equally between defense accounts and domestic discretionary spending, with each side being reduced by \$54.7 billion per year, starting in FY 2013.

The recent OMB report shows that, based on current budget estimates, all affected domestic discretionary programs (including housing and community development programs) would be cut uniformly by 8.2 percent to achieve the required savings. In addition, non-exempt defense programs discretionary and mandatory programs would be cut by 9.4 and 10 percent respectively, non-exempt nondefense mandatory programs would be cut by 7.6 percent and Medicare would

be cut by 2 percent. These calculations, as required by the Sequestration Transparency Act, are based on the assumption that discretionary appropriations are funded at the same rate of operations as in FY 2012. This assumption is likely to reflect reality, as the Continuing Resolution (CR) to fund the federal government through the first six months of FY 2013, which has already passed the House and continues to move through the Senate, contains very few anomalies (funding variations) compared to FY 2012 enacted levels. (The CR does include a 0.6 percent across-theboard increase for most programs that was not factored in the OMB estimates. The across-the-board increase could ultimately lower the sequester percentage for domestic discretionary programs by a modest amount, perhaps to 8.15 percent.)

to a recession, with GDP declining and unemployment increasing in the short term, though the deficit would decrease by \$418 billion in 2013. The outlines of such a deal have not yet emerged, and no major actions are anticipated in advance of the November elections.

^{*} Funding for programs allocated annually through lump-sum distributions is generally not disbursed until final, full-year appropriations legislation is enacted. While the final funding levels for all programs are dependent upon an FY 2013 appropriations act, it is unlikely, based on recent HUD practice, that interim (partial-year) allocations will be made for these programs.

According to the report, "The Administration strongly believes that sequestration is bad policy, and that Congress can and should take action to avoid it by passing a comprehensive and balanced deficit reduction package." Legislators on Capitol Hill are continuing to work toward a "grand bargain" on taxes and spending that would avert the "fiscal cliff," the simultaneous expiration of various tax provisions and the reduction in federal spending caused by sequestration. The Congressional Budget Office has warned that the scheduled tax policy changes and sequester will likely lead

• Analyze the local impact that sequestration cuts will have on your local agency, the services it provides and the residents it serves. If your programs are reduced by 8.2 percent below FY 2012 levels (or, in the case of the Operating Fund, 8.2 percent below your 2012 funding level, excluding any amount that was offset), how many staff positions will you have to cut? How many families will you have to turn away under the various housing assistance programs

you administer? How many vouchers will you be unable to renew? How will family self-sufficiency programs and other initiatives that serve residents be affected? How will your public housing maintenance and modernization plans change?

- Communicate the impact on your local agency to your elected officials at the local, state and federal levels. Set up meetings with your congressional delegation while they are at home campaigning or meeting with constituents during the pre-election recess. Write letters to the editor, tweet elected officials and media outlets and call in to radio shows and local news programs hosting debates. In other words, reach out and get involved. The stakes could not be higher.
- You don't have to do this alone: Inform and educate your colleagues, friends and other community stakeholders about this real and present danger to our industry. Then, plan ways in which you can speak out together to express those concerns. Consider forming an alliance with local groups that share these same interests. Think about reaching out to vendors, developers, contractors, fellow PHAs, redevelopment agencies and state and local government agencies that administer housing and community development programs. Working together is key to gaining recognition.

and Representative Seth McKeel (R-Lakeland) will serve in these powerful positions responsible for writing what will likely be an annual budget of more than \$70 billion.

Housing advocates are waiting to learn who will serve under the budget chairmen as chairpersons of the Transportation and Economic Development subcommittees, which control the Documentary Stamp funding source for all affordable housing spending. These subcommittee appointments as well as all other chairmanships and committee assignments will begin being announced shortly after the November elections and continue right up to the start of the 2013 regular session on Mar. 5, 2013.

Although Florida has once again captured the number one spot for the number of foreclosures being processed, housing sales are up in Florida, indicating a trend that could result in more affordable housing dollars available for SHIP funding and perhaps a modest amount of increase for SAIL funding as well.

Sales tax income in general is up in Florida, resulting in the current projections of approximately \$70 million of surplus. This is the first budget surplus indication in almost five years in Florida.

In the meantime, the departments of Agriculture & Consumer Services, Business & Professional Regulation, Citrus, Elder Affairs, Law Enforcement and Military Affairs have released legislative budget requests for fiscal year 2013-2014, as requested by Governor Scott.

Elections

The presidential election voting in Florida is once again expected to produce a razor thin margin for the winner. Polling

leading up to the Nov. 6 Election Day has the race a dead heat in Florida. Similarly, at least four state Senate races and at least six state House races will be decided by voters split down the middle on whether to vote Republican or Democrat.

No sooner will the 2012 elections take place, then the 2014 elections will start up. The next two regular legislative sessions are sure to include plenty of Governor Scott's initiatives as he heads toward his first reelection bid. The same holds true for Florida's Cabinet; CFO Jeff Atwater, Attorney General Pam Bondi and Agricultural Commissioner Adam Putnam, who all face their first reelections bids in 2014 as well.

Legislative Issues

The 2013 regular session will have as one of its major focuses the funding for indigent health care and Medicaid recipients, as the Affordable Health Care Act begins impacting Florida's budget. Also, Citizens Insurance Corporation will take center stage once again. Recent decisions by the Citizens' board to reduce the number of policies within Citizens by offering incentives and loans to private insurers have become controversial.

The Legislature could also have as much as \$500 million in new spending available for transportation infrastructure projects, from road and bridge construction to port and rail improvements, as a result of new transportation bonds being issued in FY 2013-2014.

Finally, FAHRO will be picking up where we left off last session, introducing our own House and Senate companion bills dealing with public housing initiatives.

BCHA and Carlisle Development Group Unveil East Village Apartments

On a hot and humid October afternoon in Davie, officials from Broward County Housing Authority, Carlisle Development Group, the Town of Davie, Broward County and the State of Florida celebrated the grand opening of East Village, a \$33 million affordable housing community.

More than 80 people, including many residents, took part in the festivities that included live music, food, beverages and remarks from the principals who took the site of a former public housing development destroyed during Hurricane Wilma and turned it into a jewel of a community.

"This development is named East Village, and it truly is a village," said Ann Deibert, CEO of Broward County Housing Authority, during the ribbon cutting ceremony. "It is home to 155 families, single individuals, elderly, disabled and children who call Davie home."

Already leased to capacity, the 155 townhomes and garden-style residences feature one-, two- and three-bedroom floor plans with up to two-and-a-half bathrooms. East Village comprises eight three-story residential buildings, a community center and more than 300 parking spaces located behind the residences to allow for a more pedestrian-friendly atmosphere.

The townhome-style buildings are situated in front of a large park, with meandering paths connecting a large network of green spaces. One of the site's best features is a 20,000 sq. ft. lake, crowning the view of Main Street. Other community amenities include a swimming pool, a large splash pad fountain, a tot lot, a computer lab, a library and a fully equipped fitness center.


